Pursuant to motion of adjournment the Polk County Board of Commissioners met in session at 8:00 o'clock a.m., January 7, 2020 in the Commissioners Room, Government Center, Crookston, MN. Members present: Commissioner Warren Strandell, Commissioner Joan Lee, Commissioner Don Diedrich, Commissioner Gerald Jacobson, Commissioner Gary Willhite and Charles S. Whiting, County Administrator, Clerk of the Board. Others present: Michelle Cote, Deputy Clerk of the Board.

CALL TO ORDER

Warren Strandell, the Chair of the Board called the meeting to order and proceeded to call for nominations for the Office of Chairman of the Polk County Board of Commissioners for 2020.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The Chair called for nominations for the Office of Chair of the Polk County Board of Commissioners for 2020. A motion was made by Commissioner Diedrich to nominate Commissioner Willhite Chair of the Polk County Board, seconded by Commissioner Jacobson and adopted by unanimous vote of the Board. Commissioner assumed the Chair.

The legislature authorized the use of these funds to offset up to 50% of optical scan precinct counters, optical scan central counters, or assisted voting devices; or up to 75% of electronic rosters pursuant to Minnesota Laws. 2017, 1st Spec. Sess., Chap 4, Art 3 § 17.

WHEREAS, Applications must be received by the Office of the Minnesota Secretary of State.

THEREFORE BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED, The Director of Property Records/Election Administrator is hereby authorized to submit a grant application on behalf of Polk County for the replacement of election equipment.

The following resolution (2020-06) was offered by Commissioner Strandell:

WHEREAS, Polk County (the “County”) has published notice of its intent to hold a hearing on the adoption of its Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan for the Years 2020-2024 (the “Plan”) and the issuance of capital improvement plan bonds under Minnesota Statutes, Section 373.40 (the “Bonds”), at least fourteen (14) but not more than twenty-eight (28) days prior to the date hereof, pursuant to and in accordance with Minnesota Statutes, Section 373.40 (the “Act”); and

WHEREAS, The Board of County Commissioners (the “Board”) held a public hearing on the date hereof on (i) adoption of the Plan and (ii) the issuance of the Bonds for the purpose of financing the construction of various capital improvements, as described in the Plan; and

WHEREAS, The CIP has been developed in accordance with the provisions of the Act, and (i) covers the five-year period beginning with the date of its adoption; and (ii) sets forth the estimated schedule, timing, and details of specific capital improvements by year, together with the estimated cost, the need for the improvement, and sources of revenues to pay for the improvement; and

WHEREAS, In preparing the Plan, the Board has considered for each project and for the overall Plan:

- (1) The condition of the County's existing infrastructure, including the projected need for repair or replacement;
- (2) The likely demand for the improvement;
- (3) The estimated cost of the improvement;
- (4) The available public resources;
- (5) The level of overlapping debt in the County;
- (6) The relative benefits and costs of alternative uses of the funds;
- (7) Operating costs of the proposed improvements; and
- (8) Alternatives for providing services more efficiently through shared facilities with other counties or local government units.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, By the Board as follows:

SECTION 1. Capital Improvement Plan. The Board hereby adopts the Plan.

SECTION 2. The Bonds; Purpose. It is hereby determined to be in the best interests of the County to issue its General Obligation Capital Improvement Plan Bonds, Series 2020A (the "Bonds"), in the aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$3,400,000, contingent upon the satisfaction of the conditions described in the Act and Minnesota Statutes, Chapter 475. The proceeds of the Bonds will be used to finance the construction of projects described in the Plan.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, That this resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

Polk County Zoning Ordinance Standards (pertinent to this request):

The PCZO standards will be read in full during the County Board meeting:

SUMMARY:

- 1) The applicant proposes to expand an existing 9 unit campground for an additional 40 campsites at the Ranch Resort located North of Maple Lake in Section 34 of Grove Park Township.
- 2) The campground would be located in the Agricultural District approx. ½ mile north of Maple Lake. This campground is not located in the shoreland district which extends 1000' from Maple Lake. The parcel is 80 acres in size and has several buildings and a house located on it.
- 3) The campers on the proposed site are planned to be located at least 100 feet from the property lines and road ROW of Co Hwy 10.
- 4) There is an existing 9-unit campground located on the site as well a horse boarding operation. Both required Conditional Use Permits in 2006 and both were approved with conditions. Some conditions of note are that 9 campsites were allowed 1 horse a piece and the boarding facility could have 60 horses on the site at any one time. Ultimately the max numbers of horses on the site was to be 69 and they were only allowed to be on the site not riding adjacent properties or down the ditch of Co Hwy 10. Any special events needed to go through separate CUP process, examples are rodeos, large trail riding activities, or horse competitions.
- 5) To date there have been no separate events that required a separate CUP and to my knowledge the horse boarding operation has had very little use.
- 6) The applicant is requesting to construct 40 additional campground sites meeting all the setback requirements and sizing standards of the ordinance.
- 7) The applicant stated on their application that if approved the horse boarding operations (dude ranch CUP approved in 2006) would be rescinded and discontinued at their request. This would alleviate initial staff concerns with the request in Spring of 2019 so the site will not be double used with CUP for a campground expansion and horse operations. The applicant has submitted a letter intending the County Board to revoke the 2006 CUP resolution (#2006-3-31) if the campground expansion is approved.
- 8) A similar expansion request was denied in 2006 because the site had two active Conditional Uses approved in 2006 and 3 months after the original 9-unit campground was approved the owner wanted to expand the

campground to 49-unit operation. There was also discussion in 2006 of a discretionary EAW for all the mixed uses of this parcel with camping sites and allowing 69 animal unit horse boarding operations. This application is treated as a new request because the applicant is requesting the prior use of the horse operations to be rescinded, so the request is different than that in 2006. As well as the Polk County Zoning Ordinance allows campgrounds with different conditions than those in 2006, so the standards have changed as well.

- 9) Mandatory Environmental Assessment Worksheets are required for campgrounds over 50 units. Discretionary EAW's can be added to the CUP if citizens petition or at the discretion of the County Board for any campground over 10 units.

APPLICANT REQUEST:

The applicant proposes to expand an existing 9-unit campground for an additional 40 campsites at the Ranch Resort located North of Maple Lake in Section 34 of Grove Park Township.

ZONING ORDINANCE REQUIREMENTS:

- 13.7000 CONDITIONAL USES. Land in the agricultural district shall be used for any of the following purposes only upon the issuance of a Conditional Use Permit.
- 13.7024 Campgrounds provided the following conditions are met:
- a. An operational plan is established and all activities are conducted in accordance with the operational plan.
 - b. A certificate of insurance and/or a performance surety is required.
 - c. The use will comply with all applicable local, state, and federal laws, rules, regulations and ordinances.
 - d. All sanitary facilities installations shall comply with the current standards of the Minnesota Department of Health, as well as any other applicable State and Local codes and standards.
 - e. Wetland delineation is completed for the area the campground will be located on.
 - f. A stipulation is made in the permit as to the number of campsites and people to be using the facility at any one time.
 - g. Campsites shall be a minimum of two thousand (2000) square feet in area.
 - h. At least 50 percent of the total project area must be preserved as open space;
 - i. Campsites must be setback one hundred (100) feet from all public road right-of-ways and property lines.

- j. Roadways must be constructed with a driving surface of fourteen (14) feet for a one-way and twenty-four feet for a two-way road.
- k. Have traffic control consisting of parking limited to individual campsite spurs and parking areas constructed for that purpose. No parallel parking on site access roads within camping area shall be permitted.
- l. Sanitation receptacles shall be provided for the campground patrons.
- m. Campgrounds shall be located on a minimum of 3 acres with a minimum lot width of 300'.
- n. The permit shall be subject to annual Administrative Review.

7.5400 Conditions Attached to Conditional Use Permits

7.5410 The Planning Commission, upon consideration of the criteria listed above and the purposes of this ordinance, shall recommend the attachment of such conditions to the conditional use permit as it deems necessary to fulfill the purposes of this ordinance. Such conditions may include, but are not limited to, the following:

- 7.5412 Limitations on the natural vegetation to be removed or the requirement that additional vegetation be planted; and
- 7.5413 Special provisions for the location, design, and use of structures, sewage treatment systems, watercraft launching and docking areas, and vehicle parking areas.
- 7.5415 Limitations on period of use, occupancy, and operation.
- 7.5416 Imposition of operational controls, sureties, and deed restrictions

7.5100 In all cases the Commission shall consider whether:

- 7.5101 The proposed use is a conditional use expressly designated in the ordinance; and,
- 7.5102 The conditional use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purposes already permitted, nor substantially diminish or impair property values within the immediate vicinity; and,
- 7.5103 The establishment of the conditional use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding vacant property for uses predominant in the area; and,

- 7.5104 Adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities have been or are being provided; and,
- 7.5105 Adequate measures have been or will be taken to provide sufficient off-street parking and loading space to serve the proposed use; and,
- 7.5106 Adequate measures have been or will be taken to prevent or control offensive odor, fumes, dust, noise and vibration, so that none of these will constitute a nuisance, and to control lighted signs and other lights in such a manner that no disturbance to neighboring properties will result.

PERTINENT FACTS:

- 1) The campground would be located in the Agricultural District approx. 1/4 mile north of Maple Lake. This campground is not located in the shoreland district which extends 1000' from Maple Lake. The parcel is 80 acres in size and has several buildings and a house located on it.
- 2) The campers on the proposed site are planned to be located at least 100 feet from the property lines and road ROW of Co Hwy 10.
- 3) There is an existing 9-unit campground located on the site as well a horse boarding operation. Both required Conditional Use Permits in 2006 and both were approved with conditions. Some conditions of note are that 9 campsites were allowed 1 horse a piece and the boarding facility could have 60 horses on the site at any one time. Ultimately the max numbers of horses on the site was to be 69 and they were only allowed to be on the site not riding adjacent properties or down the ditch of Co Hwy 10. Any special events needed to go through separate CUP process, examples are rodeos, large trail riding activities, or horse competitions.
- 4) To date there have been no separate events that required a separate CUP and to my knowledge the horse boarding operation has had very little use.
- 5) The applicant is requesting to construct 40 additional campground sites meeting all the setback requirements and sizing standards of the ordinance.
- 6) The applicant stated on their application that if approved the horse boarding operations (dude ranch CUP approved in 2006) would be rescinded and discontinued at their request. This would alleviate initial staff concerns with the request in Spring of 2019 so the site will not be double used with CUP for a campground expansion and horse operations. The applicant has submitted a letter intending the County Board to revoke the 2006 CUP resolution (#2006-3-31) if the campground expansion is approved.
- 7) A similar expansion request was denied in 2006 because the site had two active Conditional Uses approved in 2006 and 3 months after the original 9-unit campground was approved the owner wanted to expand the campground

to 49-unit operation. There was also discussion in 2006 of a discretionary EAW for all the mixed uses of this parcel with camping sites and allowing 69 animal unit horse boarding operations. This application is treated as a new request because the applicant is requesting the prior use of the horse operations to be rescinded, so the request is different than that in 2006. As well as the Polk County Zoning Ordinance changed regulations regarding campgrounds in the Agricultural district and has different conditions than those in 2006, so the ordinance standards have changed as well.

- 8) Mandatory Environmental Assessment Worksheets are required for campgrounds over 50 units. Discretionary EAW's can be added to the CUP if citizens petition or at the discretion of the County Board for any campground over 10 units.
- 9) A wetland delineation has been completed of the entire parcel, and the results indicated that the camping sites can be constructed on the parcel while avoiding wetland areas. The wetland delineation has been approved by the TEP panel and notice of decision has been received from East Polk SWCD. The preliminary sketch submitted with the application includes the delineated wetlands on the site.
- 10) The applicant submitted a preliminary operational plan that has been revised based on guidance from the 2019 spring public hearing/ Planning Commissions recommendations.
- 11) The proposed sites are planned to have septic, water, & electric hook ups. The plan is to have two or three large septic systems to serve the new campground sites and the developer plans to phase construction of the campground into 2 or 3 projects until the 49 units are accomplished.
- 12) The applicant submitted soils evaluations for the planned septic systems. Full system designs and permit applications must be filed with P&Z if the campground expansion is approved.
- 13) Road and access plans appear to follow ordinance standards. The roads will be private roads and not public roadways but must still follow PCZO width standards.

- 15) Minnesota Pollution Control Agency issues permits for storm-water management during construction whenever more than an acre of property is disturbed for road building or development. NPDES permits will be applicable to this project for the campground expansion.

COMMENTS RECEIVED:

Previous comments in Spring of 2019:

- 1) Marilyn Lindberg, Neighbor, contacted our office via phone to state that she has concerns about the horses being able to still use the site and expansion of the campground too. She said the drainage should be looked as to net impacts to neighboring properties if the horses are on the site, they pose risk to manure runoff etc. To her it seems like a lot of campers and horses allowed on the site if approved. She also stated that she was a neighbor during the 2006 hearing processes and signed the petition to require an Environmental Impact Statement.
- 2) Bruce Berquist, Neighbor, contacted our office via phone to state that his concerns are traffic on Co Hwy 10 and increased boat traffic on Maple Lake. He said that Maple Lake is crowded already and he assumes most of the campers will have boats and use the lake as of its proximity to Maple Lake. He said he is unaware of horses ever using this site in the past ten years. He added that boats are already parked at each one of the 9 campers there currently on the site, so add 40 more and 40 more boats will come if not more. He ended that he is against the project due to the traffic concerns and increased boat traffic on Maple Lake.
- 3) Ted Gladden, Neighbor, wrote a letter responding to the public notice that explained that he was present for the 2006 meeting with this same request. He added that Maple Lake is already a fully developed shallow lake with a fragile ecosystem. On weekends the present public facilities, beach, and boat launch are very busy during the summer months. The boat launch is especially congested many weekend days. Forty additional permanent RV sites will add increased pressure on the lake facilities. Most importantly, the Polk County Commission has not developed an overall land use plan for Maple Lake and surrounding area. At what point is the expansion of additional RV location too great on the infrastructure of the lake and surrounding area? Until there is an overall plan for the lake it would be ill advised to approve any request of the scope of the proposed expansion. Without an overall plan the commission is not able to make an informed decision for the well-being of all Maple Lake users and the well-being of the lake.
- 4) Rachel Klein, East Polk SWCD, wrote an email regarding the proposed expansion we would really like them to have a delineation as part of the permit and at the very least the TEP panel would need to review the site and flag off any wetland so they would be avoided.
- 5) The Maple Improvement District stated that they have no official position on the matter of Austin Pierce's application for a Conditional Use Permit for the additional campsites at Ranch Resort, north of Maple Lake.
- 6) Mary Deaver, neighbor stated via letter that they would like to register a non-approval of the application for a permit to allow more horses and campsites.

- 7) Curtis Amundson, neighbor contacted our office via phone conversation to express the neighborhoods concerns along Sandy Beach Road SE, directly adjacent to this operation on Maple Lake. He stated that the area has concerns regarding increased traffic along Co Hwy 10 and Sandy Beach Road SE. The neighbors are also concerned about the 40 additional campers and their effects on boat traffic on Maple Lake. They also feel that it should be mentioned that the neighbors are concerned that the Pierces will try to use their daughters' cabin location on Sandy Beach Road to have boat slips to allow people from this campground to have a spot to permanently park a boat. He added that there have been a few horses on the site a long time ago but recently no horse activity occurs.

New Comments from 2020 CUP expansion Notice:

- 1) Ted Gladden, neighbor, wrote an email responding to the public notice that explained he opposes the campground expansion request. He added that Maple Lake is already a fully developed shallow lake with a fragile ecosystem. On weekends during the summer months the present public facilities, beach, and boat launch are very busy. The boat launch is especially congested many weekend days. He also notes there are already plenty of camping facilities available at Maple Lake. Forty additional permanent RV sites will add increased pressure on the lake facilities and possibly 160 people to the immediate area. Most importantly, Polk County has a comprehensive plan that dates to 1998 but how does it provide an objective benchmark for development 22 years later? For this reason, he feels an updated plan is needed and that no applications should be approved until the County has an updated comprehensive plan. Any decisions will tend to be arbitrary in nature and not reflective of the best use of the lake and surrounding area.
- 2) Mary Deaver, neighbor, wrote that she owns a cottage at Maple Lake and would like to state opposition of the proposed additional 40 campsites. She added they have seen what happens when you jam temporary housing on land near valuable permanent home sites so, they want it on record they oppose the expansion.
- 3) Susan & Gordy Claussen, neighbor, contacted our office via phone conversation and stated that they oppose the request because Maple Lake is already crowded. They added that fires and access to the lake are concerns as well as campers being allowed to clear trees so they could be seen from the roadways. They feel this could cause smoke nuisances and they feel their property values could plummet as well.
- 4) Curtis Amundson, neighbor, contacted our office and wanted to clarify why this request was being brought before the County again. I explained to him that the matter was tabled last year to get a wetland delineation completed to know if the site was upland or wetland, which has been completed. He added that they don't need any more people on the lake, kids operating golf carts and the increased traffic are his major concerns. He wanted to know how to stop this expansion and added that he may explore how to purchase this property to not have this operation expanded.

- 5) Steve Tischman, Grove-Park Township Supervisor, stated via office visit that the Township has no objection to the campground expansion. They feel if people want to camp out in the woods, more power to them and it seems like a good spot to have this operation. The land is low but if it can be turned into camping spots then it could be a good use of the site.
- 6) MDH, Sharon Carlson, via email indicated that the Ranch Resort was licensed currently for 9 campsites and that Polk County acts first on the conditional use application, then there is a review process on the State level.

PLANNING COMMISSION & STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Planning Commission & Staff recommends that the applicant has completed the steps that were laid out in the prior public hearing in the spring of 2019 to pursue a campground expansion. The wetlands located on the parcel have been delineated and identified that indeed the site has uplands that are suitable for development. The operational plan has been amended based on guidance during the prior public meeting to address neighboring landowners' concerns.

Staff feels this site could serve a campsite need that was identified in a campground inventory done in the summer of 2019. This inventory identified many noncompliant campers along all areas around Maple Lake, some were operating as mini-campgrounds. Staff has worked diligently to try and identify and correct these issues with campers scattered on front lots and backlots. Planning & Zoning staff has concluded from this camper inventory that there is a need for more responsible camping places for campers to be located around the Mentor area. Thus, this campground could fill a need in a place that is heavily wooded which will help buffer the use from neighboring properties both aesthetically and from noise. The project should have little environmental impacts on the surface waters of Maple Lake due to its proximity and existing wetland storage capacity. If neighboring concerns are addressed through the conditions listed below the use could co-exist without being injurious to the use and enjoyment of existing nearby land uses. For these reasons staff feels the Planning Commission should recommend approval of the campground expansion with the following conditions:

1. A 50 foot tree vegetative buffer should be maintained and/or established if not present for aesthetics and to help control some noise or visual nuisances from the campground expansion.
2. The valid Conditional Use Permit for operations of the horse operations on the site must be rescinded at the landowners' request prior to the campground expansion. This is not intended to unilaterally regulate the site of a prior use but a measure to alleviate the acreage usage that horse uses require that are now planned to be camping sites.
3. Parking area should only allow 1 alternative parking spot per campground site that is the size of a standard pickup and boat trailer.
4. Campground must not be in operations during deer rifle season to alleviate the safety hazards of hunting on adjacent lands.
5. Campers must always be road ready with current licenses, wheels inflated and tires on axels.

6. Septic designs/ permits must be submitted for the planned septic systems and all sanitary facilities installations shall comply with the current standards of the Minnesota Department of Health, as well as any other applicable State and Local codes and standards.
7. NPDES storm-water permit (MPCA) & Minnesota Department of Health campground permit must be obtained prior to the campground expansion construction.
8. This campground and its patrons shall not have controlled access or cannot provide such access points for boating recreation on Maple Lake.
9. The total maximum number of people on the campground site at any one time shall not exceed 300 people.
10. Operational plan to be finalized and approved by Planning & Zoning staff prior to the campground expansion.
11. The use will comply with all applicable local, state, and federal laws, rules, regulations and ordinances.
12. The permit shall be subject to annual Administrative Review.

All reasonable means will be taken to make your residency here a safe and pleasant one. The following rules and regulations are made to insure fairness to all residents. They are designed to protect the rights and property of all parties.

1. RV campers can stay on your lot year round if you have committed to the site for following season.
2. Resort will supply hook-ups for sewer, water, and electric. However, each tenant is responsible for setting up and paying their own accounts with each utility company. Each site will have its own electric meter and you are responsible for paying own. Electric. Company is Wild Rice Electric out of Mahnomon, MN.
3. All tenants must provide fresh water backflow connectors as required by State of MN and must be disconnected from the water post in fall prior to winterizing. All sites must use a universal connector when hooking up to the septic system.
4. All campers must be approved prior to being allowed to move into the campground. All campers must be licensed and road ready to move without placing wheels back on them.
5. Length of season will depend on weather. Approximately open April 1 – October 31. Water will be turned on in spring, and turned off in fall.
6. Lot sizes vary in size, most are 70'x100' or larger.
7. Tenants are responsible for mowing own grass, trimming your own trees, etc. for your lot in a timely manner. .
8. Absolutely not cutting down trees without permission of management
9. Decks, screen porches, 12' x 16' max sheds, fire pits, and lawn furniture are allowed. See resort management for further details and final approval regarding setback rules. This is acceptable so long as a permit is obtained from Polk County Planning & Zoning for these structures prior to placement or construction. All sheds shall require a building permit as well as any deck that is three feet or more in height (including the railings).



Utility connections that leak, are unsafe, impede yard maintenance, and/or violate any health or safety code or regulations, 7. Exterior carpet which is torn, dirty or loose, 8. Generally dirty appearance of RV/camper. Campers must be maintained and washed regularly.
13. Children must be supervised at all times. **DO NOT** use the roads as a sandbox.
 14. Pets are OK as long as they are on leashes or tied up at all times, and they do not become a pest or nuisance to other tenants or damage any property. Tenant may not have more than two pets on the property. Bark collars are required especially if your dog is left in the camper alone or unattended. Tenant is responsible for any claim, loss or damage caused by Tenant's pet(s). Use common sense. Clean up waste immediately.
 15. You are allowed to have company and guests stay occasionally in your camper or in a tent on your site. Only one camper per site is permitted. Six people per site maximum with 2 vehicles per site. 300 people maximum allowed. Overflow parking will be parked in designated parking location.
 16. No vehicles, whatsoever, are allowed to be parked on the roadways or streets. They must be parked in your lot or a designated resort parking lot. This is a county and state emergency requirement. Vehicles/boats are limited to what fits on each campsite. Overflow parking is available in a designated area for boats and vehicles. Each campsite is allowed one parking spot with a truck and trailer combination in the overflow parking area.
 17. The main entrance is to be used by all tenants. Please advise all your guests of this rules when coming to visit.
 18. All residents must agree to make the resort look as nice as possible. Dispose of all normal garbage in the dumpsters provided. Absolutely no dumping of human waste. We have been informed that violators could be subject to fines.

The tanks and functionality simply be assessed. This is not to be confused with a compliance inspector which may only be completed by a licensed professional.








Proposed: Conditional Use Permit to add 40 campground sites to an existing 9 site Ranch Resort Campground. Parcel #32.00192.00.



WHEREAS, Outdoor Investments LLC owns land described as, The East Half of the Northeast Quarter (E½NE¼) of Section Thirty-four (34), Township One Hundred Forty-nine (149), Range Forty-three (43), Polk County, Minnesota, parcel #32-192.

WHEREAS, Outdoor Investments LLC plan meets all requirements of the Polk County Zoning Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, The Polk County Board of Commissioners finds:

1. Outdoor Investments LLC are proposing a to expand their recreational campground facility of 9 units to 49 units on the 80 acre parcel.
2. The campground would be located in the Agricultural District approx. 1/4 mile north of Maple Lake. This campground is not located in the shoreland district which extends 1000' from Maple Lake. The parcel is 80 acres in size and has several buildings and a house located on it.
3. The campers on the proposed site are planned to be located at least 100 feet from the property lines and road ROW of Co Hwy 10.
4. There is an existing 9-unit campground located on the site as well a horse boarding operation. Both required Conditional Use Permits in 2006 and both were approved with conditions. Some conditions of note are that 9 campsites were allowed 1 horse a piece and the boarding facility could have 60 horses on the site at any one time. Ultimately the max numbers of horses on the site was to be 69 and they were only allowed to be on the site not riding adjacent properties or down the ditch of Co Hwy 10. Any special events needed to go through separate CUP process, examples are rodeos, large trail riding activities, or horse competitions.
5. To date there have been no separate events that required a separate CUP and to my knowledge the horse boarding operation has had very little use.

6. The applicant is requesting to construct 40 additional campground sites meeting all the setback requirements and sizing standards of the ordinance.
7. The applicant stated on their application that if approved the horse boarding operations (dude ranch CUP approved in 2006) would be rescinded and discontinued at their request. This would alleviate initial staff concerns with the request in Spring of 2019 so the site will not be double used with CUP for a campground expansion and horse operations. The applicant has submitted a letter intending the County Board to revoke the 2006 CUP resolution (#2006-3-31) if the campground expansion is approved.
8. A similar expansion request was denied in 2006 because the site had two active Conditional Uses approved in 2006 and 3 months after the original 9-unit campground was approved the owner wanted to expand the campground to 49-unit operation. There was also discussion in 2006 of a discretionary EAW for all the mixed uses of this parcel with camping sites and allowing 69 animal unit horse boarding operations. This application is treated as a new request because the applicant is requesting the prior use of the horse operations to be rescinded, so the request is different than that in 2006. As well as the Polk County Zoning Ordinance changed regulations regarding campgrounds in the Agricultural district and has different conditions than those in 2006, so the ordinance standards have changed as well.
9. Mandatory Environmental Assessment Worksheets are required for campgrounds over 50 units. Discretionary EAW's can be added to the CUP if citizens petition or at the discretion of the County Board for any campground over 10 units.
10. A wetland delineation has been completed of the entire parcel, and the results indicated that the camping sites can be constructed on the parcel while avoiding wetland areas. The wetland delineation has been approved by the TEP panel and notice of decision has been received from East Polk SWCD. The preliminary sketch submitted with the application includes the delineated wetlands on the site.
11. The applicant submitted a preliminary operational plan that has been revised based on guidance from the 2019 spring public hearing/ Planning Commission's recommendations.
12. The proposed sites are planned to have septic, water, & electric hook ups. The plan is to have two or three large septic systems to serve the new campground sites and the developer plans to phase construction of the campground into 2 or 3 projects until the 49 units are accomplished.
13. The applicant submitted soils evaluations for the planned septic systems. Full system designs and permit applications must be filed with P&Z if the campground expansion is approved.

14. Road and access plans appear to follow ordinance standards. The roads will be private roads and not public roadways but must still follow PCZO width standards.
15. The Minnesota Department of Health/Minnesota Department of Labor & Industry permits campgrounds and have regulations which affect the design and layout of the lots, septic and water systems. MDH/MN Labor & Industry will not issue permits until Polk County has processed the CUP. MDH indicated via email that this operation is a separate entity than the Maple Lake Resort campground located a half mile to the West of the proposed site.
16. Minnesota Pollution Control Agency issues permits for storm-water management during construction whenever more than an acre of property is disturbed for road building or development. NPDES permits will be applicable to this project for the campground expansion.
17. The proposed use is a conditional use expressly designated in the ordinance; and,
18. That the conditional use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purposes already permitted, nor substantially diminish and impair property values within the immediate vicinity.
19. That the establishment of the conditional use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding vacant property for uses predominant in the area.
20. That adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities have been or are being provided.
21. That adequate measures have been or will be taken to provide sufficient off-street parking and loading space to serve the proposed use.
22. That adequate measures have been or will be taken to prevent or control offensive odor, fumes, dust, noise and vibration, so that none of these will constitute a nuisance, and to control lighted signs and other lights in such a manner that no disturbance to neighboring properties will result.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the Polk County Board of Commissioners grants a conditional use permit to Outdoor Investments LLC with the following conditions:

1. That the conditional use will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purposes already permitted, nor substantially diminish and impair property values within the immediate vicinity.

2. That the establishment of the conditional use will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding vacant property for uses predominant in the area.
3. That adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other necessary facilities have been or are being provided.
4. That adequate measures have been or will be taken to provide sufficient off-street parking and loading space to serve the proposed use.
5. That adequate measures have been or will be taken to prevent or control offensive odor, fumes, dust, noise and vibration, so that none of these will constitute a nuisance, and to control lighted signs and other lights in such a manner that no disturbance to neighboring properties will result.
6. That the use of the property shall at all times be in compliance with all federal, State of Minnesota, and County of Polk rules and regulations.
7. That all Federal, State and local regulations are followed regarding the handling and storage of hazardous materials.
8. A 50 feet tree vegetative buffer should be maintained and/or established if not present for aesthetics and to help control some noise or visual nuisances from the campground expansion.
9. The valid Conditional Use Permit for operations of the horse operations on the site must be rescinded at the landowners' request prior to the campground expansion. This is not intended to unilaterally regulate the site of a prior use but a measure to alleviate the acreage usage that horse uses require that are now planned to be camping sites.
10. Parking area should only allow 1 alternative parking spot per campground site that is the size of a standard pickup and boat trailer.
11. Campground must not be in operations during deer rifle season to alleviate the safety hazards of hunting on adjacent lands.
12. Campers must always be road ready with current licenses, wheels inflated and tires on axels.
13. Septic designs/ permits must be submitted for the planned septic systems and all sanitary facilities installations shall comply with the current standards of the Minnesota Department of Health, as well as any other applicable State and Local codes and standards.
14. NPDES storm-water permit (MPCA) & Minnesota Department of Health campground permit must be obtained prior to the campground expansion construction.


