SUMMARY:

- 1) Legislation requires that Polk County must establish, by resolution or through adoption of a plan, guidelines for the use of the proceeds which are to prevent the introduction or limit the spread of AIS at water access sites within the County. This plan shall be updated by December 31st of every year.
- 2) The MN DNR requires paperwork to file a permit with them for three year periods 2018-2020. I was unaware that a new resolution was required on an annual basis with the Board of Commissioners.
- 3) The Polk County AIS Taskforce has been meeting throughout the prior years and the past years have went well. The two full-time and one part-time inspectors for watercraft inspectors did a nice job over the past summers and the two I-LIDS camera systems performed well.
- 4) AIS Taskforce has reviewed and approved the plan annually we do a draft at the beginning of the year and final near the end of the year. Before you today is a final plan for the 2018 season and final plan for 2019 season. The 2020 season is in draft form and thus only a motion to proceed is needed on that matter.
- 5) I will be bringing the 2020 resolution to the County Board later in the year and annually update the Board from here forward.

2018 Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention Plan for Polk County

Guidelines for using Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention Aid (MN Statue 477A.19)

INTRODUCTION

Aquatic invasive species (AIS) are threatening Minnesota waters. These nonnative species harm fish populations, water quality, property values and water recreation. This plan outlines the efforts that Polk County will undertake to help prevent the spread of harmful AIS within Minnesota.

ACTIONS

The following categories will provide a template for implementing action items in order to prevent the spread of AIS in Polk County.

- **Education/Public Awareness**
- **Decontamination**
- **Inspections/Enforcement**
- **Special Projects**
- **Emergency Response**
- **Administration/Coordination**

Education/Public Awareness

Public Service Announcements – Conduct radio, television, newspaper, billboard, and other media ads promoting the awareness and prevention of AIS in the County.

Educational Handouts – Work with local agencies to distribute information on AIS prevention through educational handouts including but not limited to constructing signs, billboards, and information stands at water access sites across Polk County.

Youth Outreach – Work with schools around Polk County to provide an educational information/presentations to school age children to learn about the prevention and control of AIS. Develop a project/essay contest for school age children within Polk County.

Public Outreach – Establish a presentation/information stand and or program that may be used for special events across Polk County like the Polk County Fair. Develop and distribute promotional pamphlets and material to distribute around Polk County.

Collaborate with lake associations, local and state agencies to conduct outreach, education and monitoring of AIS related activities.

Decontamination

Investigate the cost and feasibility of purchasing high pressure wash/decontamination units for use in cleaning boats and equipment used in lakes within Polk County.

Establish a priority list and plan to purchase and maintain decontamination units within Polk County, including but not limited to site improvements, training, signage, installation, operation and maintenance of those units. Project may be implemented this year in 2018, or may again be carried over to 2019.

Inspections/Enforcement

Program has been created to conduct watercraft inspections at water accesses using authorized inspectors. Three seasonal staff will be hired in 2018 to conduct watercraft inspections and a plan will be established to determine what accesses within the county will be inspected. Priority will be given to high priority water accesses and peak usage times.

Train and use peace officers to monitor and enforce state regulations by ensuring peace officers are properly trained to deal with AIS laws and by increasing patrolling and monitoring of waterways in Polk County.

Zebra mussel monitoring kits will be developed and setup at public water access sites within the County. AIS staff will monitor sites and report any new infestations of zebra mussels. AIS staff may conduct surveys on lakes to check for new invasive species.

In 2017 Polk County purchased two I-LIDS systems for Maple Lake and Union Lake to help with the inspection and enforcement program. Polk County will continue to maintain and operate these two units in 2018 and beyond.

Special Projects

Allow local units of government and or lake associations to apply for grant funding from the County to utilize the AIS funding for special projects as long as it is directly tied to the spread and/or prevention of AIS across Polk County.

Emergency Response

Continue to develop and improve management strategies to detect new invasive species infestations and limit the spread of established populations of AIS within Polk County and to other waters of the state. In 2017 a rapid response plan was approved in hopes of limiting spread or eliminating new outbreaks of AIS. 2018 will focus on carrying over a set amount of funding that will be available to implement rapid response measures.

Administration/Coordination

Administration and coordination of AIS funding and the AIS taskforce will be handled by the Polk County Environmental Services Department (PCES). PCES will be the lead in implementing projects, coordinating meetings, and providing financial oversight.

IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

It is again the intent of the AIS Taskforce that in 2018 education and public awareness will be given the highest priority. Work will be done to make sure the AIS message is properly advertised around Polk County. Special projects will also be funded and allocated funding. While achieving adequate public awareness measures, Polk County will continue to focus more on inspection efforts. Decontamination efforts within the County will be evaluated and may be pursued in 2018. As our inspection program continues to grow within the County we will have a better idea for the best options for decontamination.

Polk County will utilize all of the 2017 AIS funding dollars by the end of 2018 for projects noted herein. Polk County plans to carry over approximately 3% of funding from 2018 to add to the emergency response fund. Additional funding will continue to be allocated to this fund in 2019 and beyond.

Any remaining 2018 grant funds shall be carried over and utilized with 2019 grant funds in order to have enough funding available to continue to build on the inspection and decontamination programs within Polk County in 2019 and beyond. 2018 funding may also be utilized in 2019 for other projects relating to the Polk County Action plan.

UPDATING AND AMENDING THE PLAN

This plan will be reviewed annually by the Polk County AIS Committee and updated as needed.

MONITORING AND REPORTING

Polk County will track and monitor progress made by the Polk County AIS Taskforce in an effort to achieve measurable goals and actions laid out within this plan. A copy of projects completed will be kept on file at Polk County Environmental Services and reviewed by the Polk County AIS Taskforce as needed.

2018 Polk County Aquatic Invasive Species Plan

RESOLUTION (2020-28)

The following resolution (2020-28) was offered by Commissioner:

WHEREAS, 2014 Session Law Chapter 308 enacted by the Legislature provides Minnesota counties a County Program Aid grant for Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) prevention. The amount designated for each county is based on the number of watercraft trailer launches as well as the number of watercraft trailer parking spaces within each county. Polk County was allocated \$24,932 for 2014, \$55,405 for 2015, \$55,187.00 for 2016, \$65,563 for 2017, \$65,073 for 2018 and years following, and

WHEREAS, the legislation requires that Polk County must establish, by resolution or through adoption of a plan, guidelines for the use of the proceeds which are to prevent the introduction or limit the spread of AIS at water access sites within the County, and

WHEREAS, the county may appropriate the proceeds directly or may use any portion of the proceeds to provide funding for a joint powers board or cooperative agreement with another political subdivision, a soil and water conservation district in the county, a watershed district in the county, or a lake association located in the county. Any money appropriated by the county to a different entity or political subdivision must be used as required under this section, and

WHEREAS, the county must submit a copy of its guidelines for use of the proceeds to the Department of Natural Resources by December 31 of the year the payments are received, and

WHEREAS, the threat of the introduction and spread of AIS is acknowledged as a serious concern to the health of the environmental and economic health of Polk County, and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the Polk County Board of Commissioners designates oversight of Polk County's AIS prevention efforts to the Polk County Environmental Services Department and delegates to them the responsibility to prepare, implement and report annually a plan to allocate the funding in accordance with the above legislation. Allocation of funding, grant requests and plan updates are to be approved by the Polk County AIS Taskforce. A copy of the approved AIS plan will be kept on file in the Polk County Environmental Services Department.

2019 Polk County Aquatic Invasive Species Plan

RESOLUTION (2020-29)

The following resolution (2020-29) was offered by Commissioner:

WHEREAS, 2014 Session Law Chapter 308 enacted by the Legislature provides Minnesota counties a County Program Aid grant for Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) prevention. The amount designated for each county is based on the number of watercraft trailer launches as well as the number of watercraft trailer parking spaces within each county. Polk County was allocated \$24,932 for 2014, \$55,405 for 2015, \$55,187.00 for 2016, \$65,563 for 2017, \$65,073 for 2018 and \$65,042 for 2019, and

WHEREAS, The legislation requires that Polk County must establish, by resolution or through adoption of a plan, guidelines for the use of the proceeds which are to prevent the introduction or limit the spread of AIS at water access sites within the County, and

WHEREAS, The county may appropriate the proceeds directly or may use any portion of the proceeds to provide funding for a joint powers board or cooperative agreement with another political subdivision, a soil and water conservation district in the county, a watershed district in the county, or a lake association located in the county. Any money appropriated by the county to a different entity or political subdivision must be used as required under this section, and

WHEREAS, The county must submit a copy of its guidelines for use of the proceeds to the Department of Natural Resources by December 31 of the year the payments are received, and

WHEREAS, The threat of the introduction and spread of AIS is acknowledged as a serious concern to the health of the environmental and economic health of Polk County, and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, That the Polk County Board of Commissioners designates oversight of Polk County's AIS prevention efforts to the Polk County Environmental Services Department and delegates to them the responsibility to prepare, implement and report annually a plan to allocate the funding in accordance with the above legislation. Allocation of funding, grant requests and plan updates are to be approved by the Polk County AIS Taskforce. A copy of the approved AIS plan will be kept on file in the Polk County Environmental Services Department.

2020 Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention Plan for Polk County

Guidelines for using Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention Aid (MN Statute 477A.19)

INTRODUCTION

Aquatic invasive species (AIS) are threatening Minnesota waters. These nonnative species harm fish populations, water quality, property values and recreation on the waters themselves. This plan outlines the efforts that Polk County will undertake to help prevent the spread of harmful AIS within Minnesota.

ACTIONS

The following categories will provide a template for implementing action items to prevent the spread of AIS in Polk County.

- **Education/Public Awareness**
- **Decontamination**
- **Inspections/Enforcement**
- **Special Projects**
- **Emergency Response**
- **Administration/Coordination**

Education/Public Awareness

Public Service Announcements – Conduct radio, television, newspaper, billboard, and other media ads promoting the awareness and prevention of AIS in the County.

Educational Handouts – Work with local agencies to distribute information on AIS prevention through educational handouts including but not limited to constructing signs, billboards, and information stands at water access sites across Polk County.

Youth Outreach – Work with schools around Polk County to provide an educational information/presentation to school age children to learn about the prevention and control of AIS. Develop a project/essay contest for school age children within Polk County.

Public Outreach – Establish a presentation/information stand about our program that may be used for special events across Polk County like the Polk County Fair. Develop and distribute promotional pamphlets and material to distribute around Polk County relating to current events and new species introduction to area lakes.

Collaborate with lake associations, local and state agencies to conduct outreach, education and

monitoring of AIS related activities.

Decontamination

Investigate the cost and feasibility of purchasing high pressure wash/decontamination units for use in cleaning boats and equipment used in lakes within Polk County.

Establish a priority list and plan to purchase and maintain decontamination units within Polk County, including but not limited to site improvements, training, signage, installation, operation and maintenance of those units. Projects may be implemented this year in 2020, or may again be carried over to 2021 for equipment purchases to help prevent the spread of AIS in Polk County.

Inspections/Enforcement

Watercraft Inspection Programs have been created to educate and enforce AIS rules at local water accesses using authorized inspectors. Two or three seasonal staff will be hired in 2020 to conduct watercraft inspections and a plan will be established to determine what accesses within the county will be inspected. Priority will be given to higher priority water accesses at peak usage times to educate as many lake/river users as effectively possible.

Train and use peace officers to monitor and enforce state regulations by ensuring peace officers are properly trained to deal with AIS laws and by increasing patrolling and monitoring of waterways in Polk County. This partnership with local law enforcement is vital to regulate the rules and regulations of AIS in the State of Minnesota.

Zebra mussel monitoring kits will be developed and setup at public water access sites within the County. AIS staff will monitor sites and report any new infestations of zebra mussels. AIS staff may conduct surveys on lakes to check for new invasive species.

In 2017 Polk County purchased two I-LIDS systems for Maple Lake and Union Lake to help with the inspection and enforcement program. Polk County will continue to maintain and operate these two units in 2020 and beyond.

Special Projects

Allow local units of government and or lake associations to apply for grant funding from the County to utilize the AIS funding for special projects if it is directly related to reduce the spread and/or prevention of AIS across Polk County.

Emergency Response

Continue to develop and improve management strategies to detect new invasive species infestations and limit the spread of established populations of AIS within Polk County and to other waters of the state. In 2017 a rapid response plan was approved in hopes of limiting spread

or eliminating new outbreaks of AIS. In 2020, we will again focus on carrying over a set amount of funding that will be available to implement rapid response measures.

Administration/Coordination

Administration and coordination of AIS funding and the AIS taskforce will be handled by the Polk County Environmental Services Department (PCES). PCES will be the lead in implementing projects, coordinating meetings, and providing financial oversight.

IMPLEMENTATION PLAN

It is again the intent of the AIS Taskforce that in 2020 education and public awareness will be given the highest priority. Work will be done to make sure the AIS message is properly advertised around Polk County. Special projects will be funded to help lake/river users to have the tools to effectively clean recreational tools with allocated funding. While achieving adequate public awareness measures, Polk County will continue to focus on inspection of watercrafts both propelled and nonmotorized watercrafts. This is as much an education for lake/river users as is classroom time with our youth.

Decontamination efforts within the County will be evaluated and may be pursued in 2020. As our inspection program continues to grow within the County we will have a better idea for the best options for decontamination.

Polk County will utilize all of the 2019 AIS funding dollars by the end of 2020 for projects noted herein. Polk County plans to carry over approximately 6% of funding from 2020 to add to the emergency response fund. Additional funding will continue to be allocated to this fund in 2020 and beyond for future costs associated with new AIS infestations.

Any remaining 2020 grant funds shall be carried over and utilized with 2021 grant funds to have enough funding available to continue to build on the inspection and decontamination programs within Polk County in 2020 and beyond. Remaining 2020 funding may also be utilized in 2021 for other projects relating to the Polk County Action plan.

UPDATING AND AMENDING THE PLAN

This plan will be reviewed annually by the Polk County AIS Taskforce and updated as needed.

MONITORING AND REPORTING

Polk County will track and monitor progress made by the Polk County AIS Taskforce to achieve measurable goals and actions laid out within this plan. A copy of projects completed will be kept on file at Polk County Environmental Services and reviewed by the Polk County AIS Taskforce as needed.



AGENDA ITEM: Buffer Update – Administrative Penalty Order Process

SUMMARY:

- 1) Would like to provide a general update to the Board regarding the Buffer Program.
- 2) SWCD & County staffs have been working together to inventory and inform landowners of noncompliant buffers along both public waters and public ditch systems. This has not been an easy program to implement simply due to the magnitude of mailings and data tracking that must occur.
- 3) To date over 700 noncompliant letters have been sent out to notify landowners of issues with most of the workload in the western portion of the County. We have two distinct SWCD districts in our County with the western portion being dominated by ditch systems (man-made drainage systems) and the eastern portion being dominated by public waters systems (Lakes & Natural River systems).
- 4) Upcoming Deadlines:
 - a. March 15, 2020 & March 29, 2020: The 11-month no penalty Corrective Action Notices will have passed and we must proceed with APO enforcement. (monetary penalty phase)
 - b. Spring of 2020 staff will have sent all Corrective Action Notices to the entire western Polk County noncompliant buffers. We will then focus on East Polk SWCD noncompliance efforts.
- 5) County Board is needed to supply staff with the direction that we move forward with two decisions to be made today. Proceed with the APO process that includes after 1-year of APO billings/ payments then the matter will be turned over to the County Attorney and prosecuted criminally. Secondly the County Board direct staff as to the documentation needed to proceed with the APO. For the first wave (approx. 12 sites) of public water noncompliant buffers we would ask the Highway Department to do a drone flyover to verify no buffer is present on the site. Some of these public water courses are impossible to get to without being invited on the landowners' property and then needing to navigate along watercourses in the field verifications of significant distances.

Administrative Penalty Order (Polk County Buffer Program)

*Failure to comply with a corrective action notice issued under section 25.3000 constitutes a misdemeanor and shall be punishable as defined by law.

25.4310 Statute of limitations. Any criminal enforcement action undertaken pursuant to section 25.4000 of this ordinance must be undertaken within two years after the alleged violation was discovered or reasonably should have been discovered by the County.

25.4200 Administrative Penalty Order (APO).

a) Initial violation. The penalty for a landowner on a single parcel that has not previously been the subject of an APO issued by the County shall be:

i. \$0 for 11 months after issuance of the Corrective Action Notice;

ii. \$50 per parcel per month for the first six (6) months (180 days) following the time period in i; and

iii. \$200 per parcel per month after six (6) months (180 days) following the time period in ii.

b) Repeat violation. The penalty for a landowner on a single parcel that has previously been the subject of an APO issued by the County or shall be:

i. \$50 per parcel per day for 180 days after issuance of the Corrective Action Notice;

ii. \$200 per parcel per day for after 180 days following the time period in i.

c) Ongoing penalty assessment. Any penalty assessed under this section shall continue until the corrective action notice has been satisfied.

25.4240 An APO issued under this section may be appealed to BWSR within 30 days of receipt by the landowner in accordance with the requirements set for the in Minn. Stat. §103F.48, subd. 9. Any APO that is not appealed within the 30-day period shall be deemed final.

25.4350 Referral for collection of penalty. All penalties and interest assessed under an APO must be paid by the landowner within the time specified in this section. All payments shall be made payable to the County. Any penalty or interest not received in the specified time may be collected by the County using any lawful means.

The plan will include the accrual of penalty fees that are billed out from Polk County Environmental Services office like tipping tickets from the transfer station. We are currently working on formulating this billing but will follow all ordinance procedure for the APO process.

If a landowner receives a bill and appeals the APO to BWSR all billing will cease until a determination is made as to the buffer compliance. If it is found to be non-compliance then we will refund or dismiss all penalty fees with the APO.

If a landowner simply doesn't pay the billings then when the calendar turns over to the next year it will be on the taxation of the parcel under a special assessment. The billings will continue in this manner until 1-year's time, then the matter will be forwarded to the County Attorney's office for criminal penalties, if directed by the board to go this direction? The other option is just continuing with penalty fees and accruing fines through taxation. *Note if the violation is not corrected within 2 years of the APO then the statute of limitation will prevent the County from prosecuting criminally.

We will continue to work with the Attorney's Office to formulate the penalty process so that we are all on the same page. This year's workload is low but there is a possibility of violations and Administrative Penalty Orders in the several hundred-next year following the 11-month no penalty Corrective Action Notices addressing public ditch systems sent earlier this year.

The Board will be updated as needed on the status of this program.

LANDFILL EXPANSION OPTIONS

Polk County has been working on its Landfill Permit since 2013. We applied for an expedited permit in 2015 and were given assurances that we would not only receive the permit in 2015, but would be doing construction of the next cells (Phases 11-12) during the 2015 construction season. We ended 2015 without a permit, constructed Phases 11-12 in the fall of 2016 without a permit, and were issued the permit in Feb 2017. That permit was issued with the requirement that many other things get resolved after the permit issuance.

These items were (in no special order):

- 1) Update LF Contingency Action Plan
- 2) Install new monitoring wells
- 3) Install Demo LF contact water collection & sampling swale
- 4) Update LF Operations and Maintenance Plan
- 5) Mitigate wetlands in expansion area
- 6) Update LF Industrial SW Management Plan
- 7) Update LF Sample Analysis Plan
- 8) Construct SSOM Compost Pad

Many of these items have been completed. Other items not officially completed have been completed – from Polk County’s part – and are awaiting MPCA approvals or feedback leading to further modifications or revisions. The only significant item out there from that list is the wetland mitigation within the expansion footprint.

Polk County has applied for the permits from the Federal, State and local authorities to impact the wetlands in the LF footprint, contacted various wetland banks for credits, and applied for the State permit to fill the wetlands. Most of this work was done in 2018.

Polk County was required to do a flora/fauna investigation as part of the EAW issued in 2016. DNR insisted that their staff would do some of the work – not qualified 3rd party inspectors. In the end we settled on DNR being able to do their work when our representatives were on-site doing the other work. This work was done over the course of the 2019 year. It was an expensive endeavor. This work yielded a less-than-favorable finding – we have a Minnesota State Threatened Species of plant – the “sterile sedge” - in two locations in this footprint. If we cannot avoid the wetland, we are required not to just replace the wetland acreage at 2:1, but also to obtain a Minnesota DNR Takings Permit which will likely require the same type of ‘penalty’ mitigation (2:1 replacment). However, other “obstacles” have been encountered which cast doubt on the integrity of the process and indicate a bias against the LF’s expansion request.

A meeting was held in Nov 2019 between Polk, Wenck and the wetland-related regulatory officials. We were asked to revisit the application and further explain the impact and request. However, one official indicated that they were not going to allow mitigation until we exhausted all avoidance options, and stated that there was ‘plenty of time’ to do so. We figure we have <2 years (2020 and 2021) to still leave time for all permits and reviews.


Currently, our request is based upon our permit that was issued. It includes a footprint of 40+ acres which impacts about 20 acres of wetlands which will require about 40 acres of wetland credits to be purchased (approx. \$600k in credits) + whatever ‘takings’ penalty is required by the DNR for the newfound ‘sterile sedge’. (nobody is hazarding a guess what that would cost) There is little doubt this entire process could ultimately cost over \$1M to obtain the permit.

One option that we could potentially do – which does not resolve the issues above, but rather delays dealing with them – would be to shrink our footprint to just outside the ‘sterile sedge’ area. This shrinks the footprint of the permitted LF (40 acres to 22 acres), reduces the number of wetlands impacted (20 acres to 3 acres), reduces the wetland credits necessary (approx.. \$600k to \$90k) and avoid the ‘takings permit’. However, this shrinks the life of the footprint approved from >50 years to approx. 20 years.

This is a decision which has multiple facets, and further discussion is necessary.





Impacts MN threatened 'Sterile Sedge' plant which will require 'takings' permit and likely 2:1 replacement or equivalent.



(Pictured Above) MSW Landfill Phases 1–18 + half of 19 and 22 topo drawing. Phases 14-18 + half of 19 and 22 shown. Approximately 20 acre footprint and lifespan of 20-25 years at present fill rates. Impacts to wetlands reduced from 19.14 acres to 2.86 acres. Requires 5.72 acres of wetland credits. No impact on MN threatened 'Sterile Sedge' species – so no 'takings' permit required.


